- Jonathan Clarke works with sand-cast aluminium in his creations.

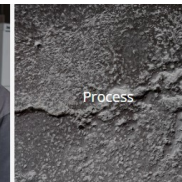
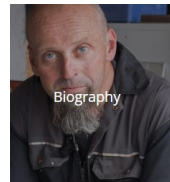


Exploring different forms of contemporary sculpture



Born in Suffolk in 1961, Jonathan Clarke is one of Britain's leading sculptors.

He works primarily in sand-cast aluminium: a process that creates entirely unique pieces of work



Ian Turnock bases much of his sculpture around nature and trees.
