
Having a sense of purpose, fulfilment and meaning in our lives helps our wellbeing, so it is important to recognise and find this in our daily lives.

A Parent's Guide

What is it?

Fortnite: Battle Royale is a game which combines Minecraft-style building with shooting for survival. It has been described as 'Call of Duty for kids' and has 40 million players worldwide. It can be played on the PC, Xbox or Playstation.

Why is it popular?

The game is fast and generally lasts no more than 20 minutes. It has a silly sense of humour and is popular with YouTubers such as DanTDM and JackSepticEye. Children may have seen their favourite YouTubers playing it and want to play it themselves.

Is it safe?

With safety settings and the involvement of parents, it can be a positive and engaging experience. The action is cartoonish rather than gory, and players work together to plan strategies and tactics. Fortnite: Battle Royale is rated PEGI 12 by the Video Standards Council for frequent scenes of mild violence.



To avoid children speaking to strangers during the game, set up a **Party** of friends before they play. This means that they are only **able to communicate with people they know**, and other players voices will be muted.

Although children will want to use headphones during the games, so they don't miss important noises, you should consider **setting the sound so it comes through the TV and headphones.** This means that you can hear what is being said during gameplay.

If they're playing on an Xbox or PlayStation you can use the **parental controls** to limit the length of gaming sessions.

Fortnite matches can last up to 20 minutes, and children won't want to stop playing in the middle of a game as they will leave team-mates in the lurch and lose any points they've earned for that game. You could **use a timer**, or discuss in advance **how long you are happy for them to play.**

Sports events at Westfield

Well done to our Year 6 Netball team who played exceptionally well as a team in their friendly game against Kingfield on Friday 21st April.

The girls, who have been training hard at netball club all year, were able to keep Kingfield from scoring only half as many goals as last time they played each other.

Adult Communication and Conduct in and with School

At Westfield we value our partnerships with parents/carers and members of our community and recognise that the children will benefit the most from good relationships and school and home working together effectively.

We have policies which clearly set out the ways and forms of communication we offer and the communication we expect all adults to model. These policies are on our website for easy access, these are:

We also have clear posters around school that remind everyone that the expectation is that everyone will treat each other with respect and that aggression, shouting and threatening behaviour will not be tolerated.


It is never acceptable to treat others in a disrespectful way, to shout, to make threats or to be verbally or physically aggressive. If visitors to our school site, including parents, behave in such a way then there are procedures we follow to ensure everyone is and feels safe. These procedures can include, a ban from the school site, a clear communication plan which sets out how the person can communicate with the school and in some instances the police will be called.

We thank you for recognising the importance of being a good role model to all the children, young people and other adults. As our Westfield Way states:

We treat others as we want to be treated.

We would also like to inform you that to protect our staff wellbeing and welfare we have taken the following action: all external emails are blocked for the duration of weekends and school holidays. Therefore, if you need to email in on one of the school email addresses please do so during the working week and you will be responded to in line with our Parent and guardian communication policy.

School drop off protocol and parking/road use considerations

Please use the Adult Education Centre car park for drop off and pick up. PLEASE DO NOT PARK IN BONSEY LANE OR HOEBROOK CLOSE as this causes a problem with the flow of traffic, and is dangerous for any child crossing the road. There are also parking enforcements in place and you may be ticketed. Please park in the designated bays only. Parents need to drop and drive off to work in the mornings, and are being prevented from this by some inconsiderate parking.

Please be aware that it is not an offence to park a vehicle on a grass verge unless there are waiting restrictions (yellow lines) on the road, as these also apply to the verge; therefore do not park on the grass verges near the school and by the garages as you may be ticketed.

Please ensure that you do not park in front of driveways or the kitchen gates, or stop on any zigzag lines. These need to be kept clear at all times for staff access and deliveries and in consideration of our neighbours.

Whilst we understand that Bonsey Lane does get very busy and everyone has somewhere to go, please be polite to all car users. Please DO NOT block the roads and car parks for other drivers.

Adult education will ask their car park attendants to monitor this and cars will be issued with a ticket if they park in this area.

Please do not smoke on the school premises or on the Adult Education premises. These are all no smoking zones.

Application for leave of absence/exceptional circumstances

As parents, you have a legal responsibility to ensure your child's attendance at school. Holidays should be taken during the school holiday period. During the academic year pupils are at school for 190 days and at home for 175 days. Students are expected to attend 100% of the time.

Please fill in a request of absence form (available from the office or online) if you want to ask the Headteacher to authorise a leave of absence during term time. You must ask well in advance and you are strongly advised to request leave of absence before you confirm your arrangements.

New legislations (Education (Pupil Registration) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013) means that if an application is not "made in advance to the Head teacher by a parent with whom the pupil normally resides, and the Head teacher does not consider that leave of absence should be granted due to the relating to that application", then it will not be authorised. We will therefore not authorise any holidays.

If you take your child out of school without the approval of the school, you may be liable to receive a Penalty Notice <u>from Surrey County Council</u> for failing to ensure your child's regular school attendance.

Holiday's in school time will not be authorised. Guidelines from the local authority are that they may issue a Penalty Notice (with a fine) to each parent, when students are taken out of school during term for 5 days or more and if this absence is recorded as unauthorised by the school (e.g. a holiday). Please note it includes cumulative absence over a 3 month period (several unauthorised absences that total 5 days within a 3 month period).

The amount payable on issue of a Penalty Notice is £60 per parent per child if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice, rising to £120 if paid within 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices. If the absence exceeds 20 days, your child's name will be removed from the school roll and you will have to reapply for a place on your return.

The Headteacher will consider the reasons for the request carefully, taking into account the effect on the continuity of your child's learning and your child's overall attendance rate, and then may authorise up to five days of absence. The Headteacher will notify you, via the office, of the decision within five working days of receiving your written application.

Leave of absence, for exceptional circumstances, will not be granted if additional leave is taken as holiday either side of this time. Proof of flights or other documentation supporting the request must be produced if asked for.

Monthly Attendance Letters

Monthly letters are automatically produced and sent to all parents whose children are late 4 times or more in a month. Monthly letters will also be produced to all parents whose child has an attendance below 90%, and for those between 91-94%. These letters will continue to be sent until the attendance is above 90%. Please be aware that this may take quite a few months.

Surrey Inclusion Officer (previously Education Welfare Officer)
The Surrey CC Inclusion Officer (Mrs Beverly King) also comes in half termly and conducts register checks and she may contact parents if children are consistently late or there are concerns about attendance.
